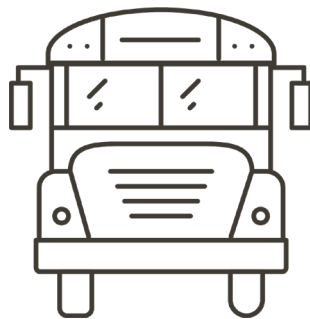

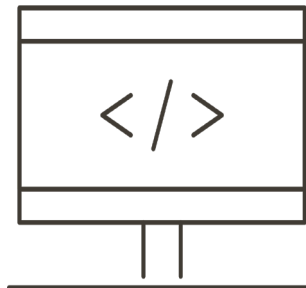

Cross Country Run

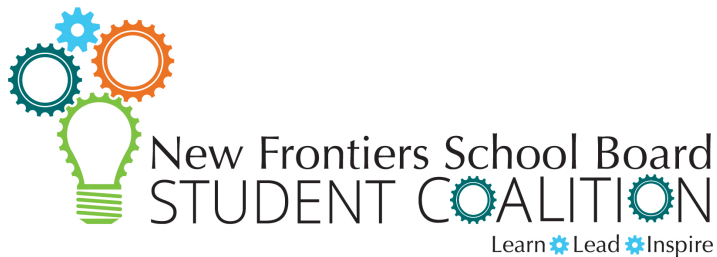

NFSB's Student Coalition provides a platform for students to collaborate and have a voice in the processes, decisions, and operations that take place within their schools/centres. This platform also provides an opportunity for reflection on issues of concern to the student body and to collaboratively develop and implement school/centre-based strategies while striving towards overall school/centre improvement. The NFSB Student Coalition is comprised of student representatives from each school/centre, elected from within their Student Council. In alternating school years, a grade 5 or grade 6 student will represent each elementary school. At least one grade 7, grade 8 or grade 9 student, and at least one grade 10 or grade 11 student will represent each secondary institution. There is also a representative from each centre. At their first meeting of the 2019-20 school year, students reviewed their school's "Tell Them From Me" survey results; this review helped them decide what school-level initiatives they would undertake. Student Coalition partnered with Montreal's Sun Youth Charitable Organization. Following a presentation by Sun Youth, each school came up with a plan to fundraise for items that are in high demand such as school supplies, clothing, toiletries, and non-perishable food items. The NFSB Student Coalition continues on its mission of making things just a little bit better for everyone!

A list of local food banks and other community “help” is sent to families

Ministry recommends that students use the online educational resources provided, but not mandatory

Province requests names of staff and students in our Health Care programs, as well as a list of our Special Ed Technicians and Attendants to help in the healthcare sector

Province-wide plea to anyone who can help out, especially in the CHSLDs

High schools will close until September

Elementary schools will gradually reopen beginning May 11. Attendance is not mandatory.

Hand washing stations are hard to find, but needed! They are installed in all our reopening schools. Sanitary measures include hand washing, social distancing, but no masks . . . yet.

Announcement made - to support schools reopening, all staff is expected to return to work

- Students continue to learn online.
- Vocational Centres start hybrid model; online and in-person by invitation.
- May enrolments - **169** adult education & SIS students; **402** vocational students

Our Chateauguy schools prepare for a May 19 reopening, but a decision was made by the government to close all schools in the Communauté métropolitaine de Montréal (CMM) . . . which includes Chateauguy.

Weekly Ministry of Education learning “kits” were provided to all students by grade level, both online or as hard copies.

Announcement made

The 2020-21 school year will be “back to normal”.

Kindergarten to Secondary 3 students will be back in the classroom
Secondary 4 and 5 will try a “hybrid” model.



An email is sent to all staff... everyone back by July 13, suggested to wear a mask when possible.

Objective 1

By 2030, reduce by 50% the gap in success rates between various groups of students

Our current gap between boys (77.3) and girls (86.4); we need to bring this down to 5%

First generation immigrants

Our current gap between first year immigrant students (75) and other students (76.6).

14.9%

Students with Learning Difficulties and Special Needs

Our current gap between regular (81.1%) and EH-DAA (66.2) students; we need to bring this down to 25.3, we are currently below that.

- 7.3%

High school students from “disadvantaged” schools

Our current gap between students from disadvantaged schools (73.5) and intermediate schools (80.8); we need to reach 4.5

Objective 2 By 2030, reduce to 10% the proportion of students starting public secondary school at age 13 or older.

Data unavailable

The percentage of our students in 2019-2020 who started high school at the age of 13 or older.

Objective 3 By 2030, bring to 85% the proportion of students under the age of 20 who obtain a first diploma, and to 90% the proportion of students who obtain a first diploma or qualification.

77.9% The percentage of students from our 2012-2013 cohort who have obtained a first diploma or qualification.

Objective 4 By 2030, bring to 90% the success rate on the Elementary Cycle 3, Year 2 English Mother Tongue Ministry Exam, Written Component (Production).

While the Minister's objective refers to Language of Instruction in Elementary 4 (Cycle 2, Year 2), a compulsory Ministry examination in English Language Arts at that level does not exist. NFSB will instead be using the results in the Ministry-set examination for the end-of-cycle 3. An annual marking centre for all grade 6 ELA teachers has been established to ensure Board-wide standards.

Objective 5

By 2030, ensure that all school buildings (100%) are in satisfactory condition.
