- Create a hospitable learning environment where everyone feels they belong and are appreciated.



#### **1 Council Meetings**

- 9 meetings were held on Teams due to Covid-19 restrictions, including a provincial curfew.
- 4 meetings were held using a hybrid model (in person/on Teams) when the curfew was lifted but social distancing rules prevented all members from being in person.
- 1 meeting was held in person, when restrictions so allowed.

#### **School Elections**

After being interrupted several times during the 2020-2021 school year, due to the Covid-19 Pandemic, School Elections recommenced in August 2021; NFSB had vacancies in Divisions 3 & 4.

Following a new nomination period, Commissioner Lina Chouinard, Division 3, and Commissioner Kenneth Crockett, Division 4, were acclaimed in September 2021.

Sadly, in July 2021, Commissioner Howard Gibbs, Division 5, passed away. In November 2021, following a by-election, Commissioner Joy Thomas was acclaimed.





NFSB's Student Coalition provides a platform for students to collaborate and have a voice in the processes, decisions, and operations that take place within their school. It also provides an opportunity for reflection on issues of concern to the student body and to collaboratively develop and implement strategies while striving towards overall improvement.

The NFSB Student Coalition is comprised of student representatives from each school.

During the 2021-22 school year, two group events were held at CVR, while individual schools worked on a variety of initiatives independently.

- Our first event was an icebreaker challenge (Human Bingo), that allowed students to get to know one another while discussing important topics; they also reviewed their schools' Our School Survey. Each school chose an initiative to work on based on their schools' results and needs.
- Our second event focused on Earth Day with our student leaders spending the day learning about the harmful effects of plastics, and the importance of reducing and reusing items before recycling them. Students worked through ArtsInspire, with artist Carol Anne Hoyte, who guided them in making junk journals out of recycled paper, cardboard, and various other art materials.

Time was dedicated to celebrating the commitments and achievements of our grade 11 students who are taking their leadership skills to the next chapter in their lives. Most grade 11's have been Student Coalition members since their elementary years, each having a tremendous impact on the NFSB community. We are confident they will continue to positively influence and serve their communities!



## **School Transportation**



#### 60 busses transported our students

Services were provided by **7 bus companies** and included:

46 Regular size; 13 Minis; and 1 Berline

8 vehicles (7 Minis, 1 Berline) transported our students with special needs to: Brenda Milner, Jewish General, Mackay, Peter Hall, Summit

#### **Information Security**

Attempts are always being made to breach our security. During the 21-22 school year we blocked:

- **157,000** spam emails;
- 55,000 phishing emails;
- 840 malware emails.

As well, 2,160 emails were reported by users to IT as "suspicious". Employees are putting their cyber security training to good practice!

# Objective 1: By 2030, reduce by 50% the gap in success rates between various groups of students

Objective 2: By 2030, reduce to 10% the proportion of students starting public secondary school at age 13 or older

The percentage of students 6.3% who started high school at age 13 or older in 2021. Our target is 6%



Objective 3: By 2030, bring to 85% the proportion of students under the age of 20 who obtain a first diploma, and to 90% the proportion of students who obtain a first diploma or qualification

76.9%

The percentage of students from our 2014-2015 cohort who have obtained a first diploma or qualification.

Our target is 84%



#### Objective 4: By 2030, bring to 90% the success rate on the Elementary Cycle 3, Year 2 English Mother Tongue Ministry Exam, Written Component (Production)

While the Minister's objective refers to Language of Instruction in Elementary 4 (Cycle 2, Year 2), a compulsory Ministry examination in English Language Arts at that level does not exist. NFSB will instead be using the results in the Ministry-set examination for the end-of-cycle 3. An annual marking centre for all grade 6 ELA teachers has been established to ensure Board-wide standards.

The percentage of students who passed the end-of-cycle 3 exam. Our target is 90%



# Objective 5: By 2030, ensure that all school buildings are in satisfactory condition

73%

The percentage of NFSB buildings in satisfactory condition.

Our target is 85%

The MEQ implemented a new provincial building assessment program which reduced the overall rating of public buildings; NFSB went from 84% to 73% in one year.
