A by-election to replace the Division #10 commissioner must take place before September 26, 2023.






#### **Our Student Coalition**

provides a platform for students to have a voice in the processes, decisions, and operations that take place within their school. It also provides an opportunity for reflection on issues of concern to the student body and to develop and implement strategies while striving towards overall improvement. The Coalition is comprised of student representatives from each school.

#### During the 2022-23 school year, four group events took place:

- **January 30**, CVR library. We started with an icebreaker, followed by a presentation by Mr. Helm. Students went through the "Tell them from Me" results from their school. They noted three highlights from their school and three areas of improvement. Students then completed a "ThoughtExchange."
- March 21, "BREAKOUT", at the Dix-30 in Brossard.
- **April 4,** HSB library. We started with a flag activity where students created a flag that best represents their school. We then had Lexis Beattie as a guest speaker.
- **April 13/14** was an overnight retreat in Wentworth North, at the Canadian Tire Camp. This retreat was run by Dynamix.

The New Frontiers School Board's Commitment to Success Plan was adopted by the Council of Commissioners on May 22, 2018; it was approved by the Minister of Education, Sebastien Proulx in July 2018.

The 2022-2023 Annual Report was deposited with the Minister of Education, on December 18, 2023, using the Government's Collecte-Info system.



#### Objective 1: By 2030, reduce by 50% the gap in success rates between various groups of students

#### **Boys & Girls**

Our current gap between boys (73.7%) and girls (86.3%). Our target is 5%

## **Students with Learning Difficulties** & Special Needs

Our current gap between regular students (84.6%) and EHDAA (55.9%).

Objective 2: By 2030, reduce to 10% the proportion of students starting public secondary school at age 13 or older

The percentage of students TBD% who started high school at age 13 or older in 2021.

Our target is 6%



Objective 3: By 2030, bring to 85% the proportion of students under the age of 20 who obtain a first diploma, and to 90% the proportion of students who obtain a first diploma or qualification

The percentage of students from our 2014-2015 cohort who have obtained a first diploma or qualification.

Our target is 84%



#### Objective 4: By 2030, bring to 90% the success rate on the Elementary Cycle 3, Year 2 English Mother Tongue Ministry Exam, Written Component (Production)

While the Minister's objective refers to Language of Instruction in Elementary 4 (Cycle 2, Year 2), a compulsory Ministry examination in English Language Arts at that level does not exist. NFSB will instead be using the results in the Ministry-set examination for the end-of-cycle 3. An annual marking centre for all grade 6 ELA teachers has been established to ensure Board-wide standards.

## Objective 5: By 2030, ensure that all school buildings are in satisfactory condition

29%

The percentage of NFSB buildings in satisfactory condition.

Our \*revised target is 39%

\*All buildings were re-evaluated using the Maximo system, with much stricter criteria than the previous system. It is also important to note that while 29% of our buildings are now "satisfactory", the coding in 100% of our buildings either increased or remained the same. In recognition of the new coding system, the Ministry has also reduced its 2023 target from 85% to 39%.
